

Where does our water come from? The tap silly!!

Severn Trent provides our water in Priors Marston and it comes from the River Leam, which rises at Hellidon Hill in Northamptonshire and then it winds its way across Warwickshire where it passes close to Draycote Water and then through Leamington Spa to Warwick where it joins the River Avon and then the River Severn.

To get to us, the water is pumped from the River Leam into Draycote Water, where it is stored before it flows along pipes towards Priors Marston. This is all quite interesting as water has a great deal of difficulty flowing uphill and Draycote Water is 302 feet (92m) above sea level and Priors Marston is 518 feet (158m), so it has to climb some 200 feet to get to us, which must involve a considerable amount of pumping by Severn Trent Water.

Draycote Water, where our water is stored, is an artificial reservoir near Dunchurch, which provides water to south and east Warwickshire (including Coventry and Rugby). It was built by Severn Trent between 1967 and 1969 (well before the water industry was privatised in 1989). It opened in 1970 and took two years to fill. At Draycote Water, five hills were linked by six dams to create the 'pond', which is 5 miles round and covers 650 acres. It is 70 feet deep and contains 5,000,000,000 gallons of water.

It has no natural feeds and all its water is pumped from the River Lean at Easthorpe, or filled by other Severn Trent reservoirs at Stanford and Brownsover. All worked well until 2012, when it reached its critical point of being only 50% full and a new pipe was built to the River Leam at Willes Meadow near Leamington Spa to uprate the in-flow of water to the reservoir. In summer, it has been used to increase the water level in the River Leam when necessary to keep the fish happy.

Starting this month, Severn Trent are spending £10m from our water bills to increase the depth of the reservoir so it can accommodate an additional 1.4m cubic m of water (which is about 560 Olympic sized swimming pools worth), whilst not increasing the surface area of the reservoir. We were lucky not to have hose pipe bans this year and this work hopefully will allow us to wash our cars and water our gardens with nice clean drinking water in the future! How Severn Trent are to undertake this work without our water coming out of the taps slightly muddy looking, I do not know, however it will still have to continue flowing uphill.



Getting rid of our poo must be easier, as it is all downhill from Priors Marston, but this has nothing to do with Severn Trent Water as Thames Water are responsible for sewage and Severn Trent simply add the cost to our bills and pass the money to Thames Water. The Priors Marston 'water treatment' plant is on Byfield Road, just beyond the sports ground. Thames Water have a three stage process for dealing with it with the Primary Treatment being a settlement tank where solid matter sinks to the bottom (don't ask what 'solid matter' is!) as 'sludge' and is taken away for further treatment. The clearer water flows over the wall to aeration lanes where air is pumped in and where useful bacteria break down and eat the harmful bacteria. It then flows into a settlement tank, where the useful bacteria sink to the bottom and the 'sludge' this creates is transferred back to aeration lanes where it does its work again and the clean water is released into a local stream. Good job we are higher than the treatment works. The sludge is applied to agricultural land as fertilizer, or sometimes taken to an anaerobic digestion plant that heats the sludge and the bacteria breaks down the waste with the resulting gas being burnt to create heat or it may be dried into blocks which are then burnt to create electricity. We are all doing our bit to reduce the use of fossil fuels!

Priors Hardwick is catered for totally by Severn Trent, with its own water treatment works that serves its population of 154 with 4.4km of foul water pipes and 1km of public water sewers. The treatment works discharge treated effluent into a tributary of the River Itchen. It has the 574th biggest catchment area in the Severn Trent region, so is actually quite a small operation.

Report from Your District Councillors – October 2025 Stratford on Avon District Council

Housing Numbers - Planning

As previously reported, the loss of the 'five-year housing land supply' following a recent appeal judgement, requires a strategic response from Stratford to close a 'gap' in planning permission numbers for housing. The Council's action plan to bring our supply back up to 5 years is in page 83 of the Cabinet papers: (Public Pack)Agenda Document for The Cabinet, 06/10/2025 10:00. Council officers will now be supported by an advisory group of councillors, with the difficult task of finding the 'least worst' way to release sites for development.

We have a significant amount of green belt land in the north of the District and the government has hoped that a new 'grey belt' designation might release more land for development in green belts. A recent information and training session by a planning barrister suggests that this has introduced complexity and lack of clarity and is unlikely to help us much, if at all.

All Councils find they are under pressure for staffing planning departments, as developers react to rapid changes in the planning regime, and Stratford is no exception in having to compete in the jobs market for planning professionals. For those interested, BBC panorama of 20 October is worth a watch.

Local Government Reorganisation

A special meeting of the Council is due on 17 November to consider how the area should be reorganised to reflect the government's wish for a unitary authority. By the time you read this, the council will have considered two options, although the government will have the final say. Either:

A single unitary Warwickshire – based on the current county council boundary;

Or

Two unitaries of: North Warwickshire – based on Nuneaton & Bedworth and Rugby; and South Warwickshire – based on Stratford-on-Avon and Warwick. Considerable work has gone into the background, which can be read here:

(Public Pack) Agenda Document for The Cabinet, 10/11/2025 10:00

The recommendation from the Council's Cabinet is for the two unitary approach, after considering many factors which weigh in either direction. (WCC have decided to favour a

whole Warwickshire approach as a continuing authority). We think the main points are: to keep representation as close to residents as possible, the likely increase in council tax of the whole Warwickshire area option, and the implication for the formation of a strategic authority 'above' this level.

Each of the District and Borough Councils and the County Council are required to make a final submission to government by 28 November. The government will then consider which options they wish to formally consult on in the New Year.

Community Grant Scheme

Stratford on Avon District Council have recently announced their Community Grant Scheme 2025 to allow Town and Parish Councils, charities and community groups to apply for a share of £350,000 to support their valuable community assets during the 80th anniversary year of VE and VJ day. The fund has been made available to honour and secure an enduring legacy of the 80th anniversary of VE and VJ days by revitalising community spaces as living memorials to the sacrifice, resilience and community spirit that secured the peace, freedom and self-determination we now enjoy as a nation.

The scheme is for capital projects to improve local community facilities, such as community centres, village halls, parks and recreation areas, outdoor spaces and for the creation of new facilities, to enable communities to continue to support and enhance the services offered from these valuable resources. So, if you know of a community hall that needs a new roof, a park that needs some new play equipment or a memorial hall in need of a new kitchen, there are two different pots to apply for: Small Grants (£5,000-£20,000) or Large Grants (£20,001-£100,000).

Community Safety

Domestic Abuse Awareness

- 2. Listen to the operator
- 3. If you can, cough or tap the handset to respond
- 4. If prompted, dial 55. This lets the operator know that it is a genuine emergency and you'll be put through to the police.

Southam Police SNT

We have met with Southam SNT to discuss ongoing concerns raised by residents, with regard to crime across the ward. We understand that a number of vehicle thefts have taken place where residents have left their vehicles unlocked. Please remember to lock your vehicles.

State of the District

At the Council meeting on 13 October, a report was presented which sets out a considerable number of facts and figures about Stratford District area. The full report can be read here in the Council papers (scroll to page 17): (Public Pack)Agenda Document for Council, 13/10/2025 14:00.

Some interesting points to note are:

Population. The population increased by 19.74% between 2014 and 2024. This is the 8th highest growth of all local authorities in England and Wales (average 7.74%). Over 65s make up 25% (average 19%).

Housing. The housing stock type availability does not follow the same pattern as Warwickshire or England. Stratford-on-Avon has far more detached houses and far fewer flats/maisonettes than the Warwickshire or English average. However, like the rest of the country, there are far fewer bungalows (10%) than any other type, despite the ageing population.

House price growth was negative - the median house represented a fall of £25,000 from September 2023. The 2024 median price was 19% above the Warwickshire median of £294,725, and 21% above the England median. Our District no longer has the highest median house price to median earnings ratio (9.07) in the West Midlands region: Wychavon has edged higher than Stratford.

The average overall monthly private rent payable in the District was £1,069. This was the third highest rent across the West Midlands, with Solihull and Warwick higher.

Approximately 2,287 dwellings were thought to be vacant across the District in October 2024.

A total net of 1,011 new dwellings was added to the housing stock in 2023/24. This represented 138% of the target for total new dwelling completions in 2023/24. Our District had the 15th highest figure of net completions out of 164 district authorities in 2023-24. (Bizarrely this high performance has not stopped the District being penalised and told it does not have a 5-year housing land supply.)

Crime. The total number of recorded crimes in the District in the year to July 2025 was 10,108. This reflects a rise of 2,204 on the previous year, although changes to the way data is released by Warwickshire Police may be responsible for some of this increase. This equates to a rate of 69 crimes per 1,000 people and is higher than the Warwickshire average of 56 crimes per 1,000 people.

The most prevalent crimes in the District were violent and sexual offences, with a rate of 22.6 per 1,000 people, which is lower than last year. This is lower than the rate across Warwickshire (30) and England (29.63).

The second most prevalent crime was vehicle crime, with a rate of 5.43 per 1,000 people. This is higher than the rate for England (4.58) and that for Warwickshire (5.38). The area with the highest numbers of vehicle crime was around Harbury (57 crimes), which possibly relates to how recording boundaries are drawn, noting the location of JLR.

Employment. 15% of the population aged between 16-64 years were classed as 'economically inactive'. In July 2025, there were 1,685 residents claiming unemployment benefit in the District.

Fuel Poverty. 14.9% of households in the District were in fuel poverty, according to the latest data for 2023, compared to 17% in the West Midlands and 11.4% in England. There was huge variation across the District in the proportion of households in fuel poverty, ranging from 25% in 'Ladbroke & Priors' to 5.9% in Wellesbourne South, with many of the areas in this Ward being similar poor performers. This is thought to be a combination of lack of mains gas heating, and lower rural incomes.

Summary Apart from the statistical review summarised above, the report includes an assessment by a local government association 'peer challenge' and lists 32 achievements by the council. The report also alludes to the challenges faced due to the government's proposed reorganisation of local councils.



As many of you know, we have ceased delivering the milk around the village, but once more we would like to thank our past and present customers for all their support.

The milk round was started nearly 100 years ago by my grandmother, Emma Brown, and my auntie, Cath Brown, when she was a young girl. The milk came to them in churns, and they delivered it round the village 7 days a week in buckets with pint and half pint measures.

In the 1960s, my dad, Den Brown, took it over, together with my mother, Brenda, delivering it 6 days a week, but due to his ill health I took the milk round over in 1983.

We then started delivering 5 days a week. In1985, I broke my leg, and a wonderful band of friends took it on delivering 3 days a week. for three months.

Years later, Covid struck and, because we were classed as vulnerable, our daughter Sam and granddaughter Evie came to the rescue and delivered it for us, wearing gloves and masks, keeping a social distance.

Because of the distance they had to travel during that time, we then dropped deliveries to twice a week. Since then, helped out by Sam's husband, Reuben, and our grandson, James, we have managed to carry on, but we reached an age thinking we really ought to retire, so we have hung up our milk crates and closed the milk shed.

We are very proud of the fact that, despite Covid, fog, floods and a lot of snow, we never missed a day... late maybe - but we got it there in the end.



FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN PRIORS HARDWICK

Our Services

This has been a quieter time for our services, with the only additional service on Sunday 9th at 9.00am for Remembrance Sunday. Over thirty of us gathered on the Village Green on a dull slightly damp morning. We followed the traditional service, with Mark Cowley reading the lesson and Lieutenant Colonel Steve Webb laying the wreath on behalf of the village and reading out the names of those from the village who lost their lives: 1914-1918: G H Haynes, E T Haynes and W Taylor and in 1939-1945: C W Harrison, A E Haynes, A Haynes, K C Haynes. The grave of Private W H Haynes, who served in the Great War, but died as a result of his service in 1916, is commemorated with a War Graves Commission headstone near the South West corner of the churchyard. Volunteers from the War Graves Commission visit periodically to maintain this grave. Our gratitude is due to Christopher Hodgson who made all the arrangements for this service.

<u>Services for December</u> Advent begins this year on Sunday 30th November, when there will a gathering for all six parishes at Wormleighton, so we shall be celebrating on Sunday 7th December (second in Advent) - our usual service, when we remember Mary and Joseph and their preparations for the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem, about 60 miles from where Joseph worked in his family carpentry business. His ancestors came from Bethlehem, so that was where he had to be registered.

On Thursday 18th December, we shall gather at 5.30pm at the Lychgate to sing well-known carols - with the 'hymn machine' to keep us in the correct key! The handbell ringers will also be present to play carols, and refreshments with mulled wine are likely to be served when our voices are exhausted. On <u>Christmas Eve at 6.00pm</u>, we shall once more engage in our traditional service of readings and carols. Mulled wine and refreshments will be served by our wonderful catering team after the service.

.....and then, Epiphany - Sunday 4th January, when we've all got over the New Year celebrations, we shall complete the Christmas celebrations by remembering the visit of the Wise Men to the new family in Bethlehem.

The Church Building

<u>The East Window</u> Since our last meeting, we have received information regarding another highly recommended craftsman in both glass and church masonry and we await a further quotation before proceeding.

<u>Project Enable</u> Following more thorough investigation, we have been able to 'bypass' an application for a full Faculty from the Diocese for the lighting and heating

in the community area of the church – and both heating and lighting are now installed. This has made a remarkable difference.

Grant and Donation We are most grateful to the Priors Education Trust, the Company and Charity now formally closed, which took over the existing school property when the County Council closed the school in 1996. PET then directed and financed its progress until 2011, when it was established as one of the first Free Schools in the country. The Parish Meeting was invited to apply for a grant for the enrichment of the community area in the church, especially regarding children. We were awarded £1,000 and then given a further £500 for the church from remaining PET funds, which we shall use in the same way. Huge thanks to all who contributed to the success of PET.

The Churchyard

<u>Trees</u> Now that the leaves are falling fast, we are urging our appointed tree surgeon to come as soon as he can!

<u>Headstones</u> We are now assured that arrangements are in hand to finance the repair of one of the unstable headstones. This is obviously a considerable expense and we have to be patient.

Visit from the new Bishop of Coventry

Bishop Sophie made a very brief stop here on 5th November during a flying visit around part of the Southam Deanery. She was keen to see the inside our church and especially to view the damage to the East window. Bishop Sophie joined us for a buffet lunch at Stockton before continuing her visit. Bishop Sophie's first parish was in the small village of Churt, Surrey for seven years, then for nine years in Burgess Hill, West Sussex. In 2019 she became Bishop of Doncaster, before coming to Coventry. Bishop Sophie is married with three grown-up children. She plays the violin and viola, and is a soprano singer.

I handed, to Bishop Sophie's PA, a dossier of all the wonderful things we're doing here. I hope she'll enjoy reading them!

<u>Donations in the Phone Box</u> Following the bounty received at the Harvest Festival, there have been fewer donations than usual, but I continue to check.

<u>Used Postage Stamps</u> continue to arrive and are gratefully received.

WEATHER JOTTINGS OCTOBER 2025

Rainfall for October 2025 came to 51mm, bringing the total for the year so far to 375mm, so 2025 remains in 2nd place as driest January-to-October this century, with 2011 having received just 302mm by the end of October. In October 2017, we received just 17mm of rain, and in four of the 26 years this century we received less than 50mm.

Average rainfall for October this century is 79mm, equalling November as the two wettest months this century. In the 26 years of this century, October received 100mm of rainfall or over in nine of them including the first three years. The wettest Octobers were in 2004 with 136mm; 2013 with 137mm and 2020 with 146mm.


The first two days of the month were dry and cloudy, but overnight on 2nd, we received 5mm and another 9mm the following day. Saturday 4th was very windy, as Storm Amy passed over us. On Sunday 5th, the temperature rose to 15°C and then to 18°C the following day. The remainder of that week was warm but cloudy, the temperature only dropping to 14°C by the Saturday.

The week beginning Sunday 12th was dull and damp with drizzle on three days, when I could only record 'Trace'. The next decent rain came on Monday 20th – 7mm, with a further 2mm overnight. Then on Thursday 23rd, came Storm Benjamin, with another 7mm of rain. By the end of that week, the temperature had dropped to 11°C, with another 1mm overnight on Friday 24th – but with a fine day to follow. Sunday 26th began with a frost and a fine morning, but became cloudy and damp later. That was the coolest day of the month with only 10°C.

Temperatures then rose during that last week as far as 15°C on Friday 31st, but in the meantime, we'd received 5mm overnight on Tuesday 28th, light showers on Wednesday 29th and again overnight, a further 6mm. Thursday 30th was dry but cloudy, with Friday 31st noticeably warmer at 15°C, but with 9mm of rain during that night.

But we shall long remember, during the last days of October 2025, Storm Melissa which hit Jamaica and the Caribbean islands so disastrously with winds of up to 185mph: a category 5 Hurricane, the worst storm ever to have hit that region. The scale and severity of the devastation was incredible.
