Musician needed!


Would anybody like to play the piano/clavinova for a Sunday morning service once a month and maybe on special occasions?

FREE FIRST AID AND DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING SESSION

The Parish Council is pleased to invite you to a free First Aid and Defibrillator Training session for our village.

The session will be delivered by Jan Southam, a trained First Responder with the East Midlands Ambulance Service and owner of JMS First Aid Training. Jan lives locally and has very kindly offered to provide this training free of charge for the community.

This practical, confidence-building session will cover basic first aid and how to use a defibrillator. Knowing what to do in an emergency really can make the difference - survival rates can increase from around 7% to as much as 50% when people feel confident to act.





Baptism or Christening?

Have you ever wondered why we have two words? Is there any difference?

To **Christen** comes from an Old English word, meaning to make a Christian, somebody who follows the way of Jesus Christ.

To **Baptise** comes from the Greek word Baptizo, meaning to immerse, submerge or dip in water. In the early years of the Christian Church, new believers were immersed in water at Easter, in a special pool. Some churches nowadays have a pool for baptisms.



Whichever word you prefer, the ceremony has the same meaning. It is a Sacrament, which means an outward sign of God's grace. It symbolises entering a new life; starting a pilgrimage is one image. And some Ministers use a scallop shell to pour the water, as a symbol.

Most people are baptised as babies, so their parents and godparents make promises for them, promising to bring up the child in the Christian life.

Of course, most of us do not remember this ceremony, so some people choose to renew their vows as adults.

Some people may be drawn to the Christian life and decide to be baptised as adults. Sometimes, adult baptism can take place in a swimming pool or a river or the sea! A church ceremony is the most usual.

Saint Leonard's Church is our Parish Church. It is and has been open to everybody in the village and surroundings since the late 13th century. It welcomes all who wish to be christened.

If you would like a baby or child to be christened, you do not have to have been christened yourself. There is no fee to pay, though some families like to give a donation to the upkeep of the church. In the first instance, contact the Bridges Group Administrator, Susan Holloway, at: admin@thebridgesgroup.org.uk She will arrange for a Minister to take the service and fix a date with St Leonard's. There will be a meeting with the Minister to talk about the ceremony and any requests, like music.

If you would like to renew your vows or be baptised as an adult, it would be good to have a preliminary chat with a Minister linked to the Bridges Group of Churches.



Our Services

By the time this magazine arrives in the villages, we shall have celebrated Mothering Sunday, 15th March, hopefully with lots of families, in a very special service led by our visiting priest Rev David Herbert.

We shall also have completed the Arts and Crafts morning on Sunday 22nd March, led by Christian Nessler and Gill Kinnear, and we look forward to seeing the results of their work on display in the Community Area.

Palm Sunday 29th March will be the 5th Sunday of the month which would normally be a joint service for all six parishes; but we shall have our service here with the usual procession, including ponies, followed by a very short service in church. This magazine should be with you by now! Please look out for more details!

Maundy Thursday, 2nd April there will be a service for all six churches, of Holy Communion with Tenebrae at 6.45pm Napton. This is a very beautiful service.

But you'll need to book your place if you wish to attend the meal.

Good Friday There will be quiet devotional services at Priors Marston at 10.30, at Lower Shuckburgh at 2.00pm and at Napton at 7.00pm.

EASTER DAY

According to the liturgical calendar, this is the day which marks three years of being without a priest for our 6 parishes!! so it's also a day when we give thanks for our visiting priest, Rev David Herbert!! For two of our churches, this has meant little or no change, but the rest of us have felt a considerable impact. It's happened for us this time as we shall be unable to hold a service of Holy Communion on Easter Day, but nevertheless we shall hold our usual service at 9.00am and endeavour to make it the 100% joyful celebration it really is! There will certainly be chocolate eggs after the service!

EASTER CAROL SERVICE

With Easter being so early this year, we seem to have been thinking about the events of Jesus's birth and then his death and Resurrection in a very short time. But we need to remember there were more than 30 years between these two events. The event of Jesus's Resurrection was so very great that it's worth celebrating again after a week – perhaps when we've had time to think more about

it. So, on Sunday 12th April, we shall once more hold the Easter Carol Service at 6.00pm in place of Evensong. This service is a real feast of well-known hymns – and tunes, which remind us that Christmas and Easter are both part of our reason for church: because without Christmas, there'd be no Easter; and without Easter, there'd be no Christmas.



Report from Your District Councillors – April 2026
Stratford on Avon District Council

Council Tax

Stratford-on-Avon District Councillors have set the district element of the Council Tax at a meeting of the Council on Monday 23 February for 2026/27. The amount residents will be asked to pay for a Band D property is £174.18, an increase of 2.99%, which, for an average, home represents just an additional 42p per month to the District Council next year. This means that all the services provided by the District Council cost £3.35 a week for a Band D household.

Last council year, Stratford District was one of the lowest taxing authorities (18th out of 164). This contributes to meeting the cost of providing a wide range of services, including recycling and waste collection, planning, street cleaning, housing, housing benefits, leisure services and children's play areas. The Council Tax from Stratford-on-Avon District Council for residents for 2026/27 for each of the valuation bands is:

A=£116.12 B=£135.47
C=£154.83 D=£174.18

E=£212.89 F=£251.59 G=£290.30 H=£348.36.

Although the District Council acts as the collecting agent for Council Tax, it only receives 7.0% of the Council Tax paid by residents. Warwickshire County Council receives the lion's share of 76.7%, the Police 12.8% and Towns/Parishes 3.5%. This means the District Council only retains 7p out of every £1 paid in Council Tax to provide its range of services.

Depending on the Parish where you live in this Council Ward, a Band D total Council tax varies between £2396.75 and £2575.90.

Anyone who thinks they could be struggling to pay their Council Tax is encouraged to contact the District Council as soon as possible, by calling 01789 260990 or email revenues@stratford-dc.gov.uk, where the team will be able to advise what help is available.

Budget items of particular interest to residents in the ward

There are a number of items in this year's budget, which we think will be of particular interest to residents in this ward. Many of these are related to supporting rural communities, residents, Parishes and the environment. They include:

- **Neighbourhood Development Plans** - £100,000 (over 3 years) Supports parish councils following this funding being cut by central government.
- **Rural Crime Advisors** – We continue to fund the Rural Crime Advisors, whom we hope many residents across the ward have already met, and if not met, heard about. Not only do the Advisors give crime prevention advice and support to residents, they are also able to loan crime prevention equipment, so that residents can “try before they buy” and the Advisors also hold crime prevention toolbox events. - **Community Safety Deputy Manager** – two year fixed term. This will introduce additional capacity into the Community Safety Team working with partners, such as the Police. As Cabinet member, Natalie is very proud to let you know that the Community Safety Team was a runner up for a national award for dealing with Anti Social Behaviour.
- **Housing to Rent** - £1,000,000 (one-off). To secure additional social housing units and reduce reliance on costly temporary accommodation. This will include residents fleeing domestic violence.
- **Climate Change Fund** - £500,000 (one-off). Fifth consecutive year of funding for local climate initiatives.
- **Volunteer Driver Scheme** - £12,000 (for 3 years). Supports transport for older and mobility-impaired residents. This is a District-wide scheme (VASA), which builds on local schemes in our area. Transport can be requested by residents here: [Community Transport – Vasa](#). You will need to register first, by calling 01789 262889 and selecting option 1, or by following the link on the webpage. Once you have registered, you can book online or call the above number and also select option 1.

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- **Veterans Healthcare and Development Officer** - £8,000 (for 2 years). Contribution to veterans support services.
- **Cost of Living Crisis Mitigation Fund** - £250,000 (one-off). Adds to projected £250,000 rollover to create a £500,000 hardship support fund. Further information is available on our website: [Cost of Living Support | Stratford-on-Avon District Council](#)
- **Health Screening Events** – SDC is supporting Health Screening Events with the Graham Fulford Trust for the second year in a row, with events across the District. More information is below.

Health Screening Events – Prostate Cancer Awareness Month

The District Council Promoted a number of Health Screen events last year. The 2025 screening programme demonstrated the significant value of proactive, community-based health checks. Across seven events, 1,137 tests were completed:

- 663 men underwent PSA testing, with 24% referred to their GP for further investigation;
- 11% of all participants recorded blood sugar levels outside the normal range;
- 80% had cholesterol readings requiring GP follow-up.

These outcomes underline the vital role screening plays in enabling early diagnosis, empowering residents to seek timely medical advice, and improving long-term health outcomes.

Stratford-on-Avon District Council is launching the first of its 2026 Health Screening events on Saturday 21 March, coinciding with National Screening Day (NSD), during Prostate Cancer Awareness Month. This will be followed up by events in our area as follows:

- Saturday 18th April - Lighthorne Heath Village Hall, Upper Lighthorne, Valiant Close, CV33 9UF
- Saturday 9th May - Graham Adams Centre, Saint James Road, Southam, CV47 0LY
- Saturday 30th May - Wellesbourne Village Hall, The School House, School Road, Wellesbourne, CV35 9NH

Tests are available at a discounted rate of £14 each, supported by District Council funding, and include:

- PSA (Prostate Screening) for men over 40
- Diabetes screening for men and women aged 18+
- Cholesterol checks for men and women aged 18+

Road Closures

We have continued to ask for the 'best of a bad job', with the road from London End Priors Hardwick to Boddington, which is now in a very poor state (as we all predicted). Following Nigel's exchanges with the new chief executive, HS2's National Head of Engagement has recently offered a meeting, but prefaced it by implying nothing can be done. We are considering how to respond to this.

Residents will also be aware that there have been long-running and repetitive road closures around the villages for other reasons. A common factor has been poor and misleading signage. Among other effects, this has created an adverse trading environment for Napton village stores, which has remained open and accessible throughout, although signs have suggested otherwise. Nigel has had detailed conversations with Severn Trent about their works and the impact on trade. It has been suggested that 'Local Business Open signs' are stored locally as a stop gap. Meanwhile, all residents are encouraged to support this local business and indeed all local businesses. Nigel has asked Severn Trent to make a complete review of their activities here and report back to the community.

And finally....

Elections - Latest News

Nigel has decided to retire as a Councillor and not serve beyond the end of this Council year. This means there will be a by-election on 7 May. Because it is a shared council Ward, the election will be for a new District Councillor to work closely with the existing Councillor, Natalie. Readers will not be surprised that we will be asking for your support to ensure an effective team for residents by electing a Liberal Democrat colleague to work with Natalie. The by-election rules say there has to be a period before the election date, where Nigel's seat falls vacant and this means that by the time you read this, Nigel will have ceased to be your District Councillor. During that time Natalie will be your sole District Councillor. More information to follow.

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY

Hopefully, the weather will be suitable to be able to get outside and get on with some of the many jobs there are to do this month. Forsythias and flowering currant shrubs aren't as popular as they once were, but if you have them, now is the time to prune the old stems, removing roughly a third as low down as you can. Also, prune buddleias, fuchsias, winter honeysuckle and trim back lavender. Finish pruning roses and feed with rose fertilizer or well-rotted manure. There seem to be plenty of ladybirds at the moment, which will remove any greenfly, rather than apply an insecticide.

Easter is the traditional time to plant potatoes. You can grow them in large buckets if your soil is too sticky and claggy. Sow cabbages and other brassicas, radish, peas, beetroot, carrots and spinach. Home-grown carrots have a 'proper' carrot taste, unlike those bought in the supermarket.

The garden here will be open every weekend starting on Good Friday, until the end of September, to raise money for the National Garden scheme. Last year, I was able to send £1456.50 to headquarters, which is then distributed to several caring charities, including Marie Curie and Macmillan nursing. Thank you to those of you who contributed.

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WEATHER JOTTINGS FEBRUARY 2026

If Candlemas Day be bright and clear, half the winter's to come this year.

If Candlemas Day be cloudy and black, it bears the winter on its back.

Wiltshire – my home county!!

Candlemas Day was Monday 2nd this year, but we celebrated in church on Sunday 1st, as you will have read in the March magazine. It was damp with drizzle on and off all day, but not cold. Monday 2nd was similar, but it was colder and began to rain seriously that evening, with the rain turning to snow, resulting in a covering by 10.00pm. By the morning, the snow had gone, but I took 6mm of rain from the rain gauge! Wednesday 5th was a beautiful sunny day, with the temperature up to 9°C!

Total rainfall for the month was 102mm – but last year, it was only 36mm! And in 2023 only 8mm. There was a well-known phrase many years ago about 'February Fill-dyke' – meaning a wet month, but since the beginning of this century, 2020 was the first time February brought 100mm or more rain!

And the variation in the total rainfall for the past ten years is quite remarkable.....Climate Change?

In spite of the impressive total for the month, the wettest day was Thursday 5th, when it was rained lightly, on and off, from the early hours for 24 hours - but only 16mm - and then continued in a similar way for the following two days. The total for the first eight days was 32.5mm.

Monday 9th began fine, clouded over later, but remained dry, and it only began to rain again in the early hours of Tuesday 10th, resulting in 6mm. Light rain and cooler more variable weather took over for a few days in the middle of the month with heavy showers and sunny spells. There was a frost on the morning of Saturday 14th and a wonderful rainbow in the afternoon.

A further frost came on Tuesday 17th - Shrove Tuesday -and no rain at all on that day! However, Ash Wednesday was a really miserable day! Only 4°C and heavy rain from about 6.00pm. Not a pleasant drive to Ash Wednesday services - and plenty of weather warnings about flooding. 10mm in the rain gauge, but all was well around here.

The last ten days of the month continued in much the same way. A lovely sunny day on Tuesday 24th with a temperature of 13°C and only dropping by a couple of

degrees until the end of the month with another 4mm of rain between the four days.

With 100mm in January we now have a total of 202mm so far this year!


There have been widespread assertions that this winter has been the wettest ever: it certainly was as far as my records show. December 98mm; January 100mm and February 102mm! As far as monthly rainfall was concerned, February was the last of the months to achieve 100+mm this century - not until 2020, with 112mm, did February receive 100mm or over, as you can see below. After that, there came another three, quite quickly! The first 15 years of the century netted an average of 50mm. That has now risen to 53.8mm.

Although I don't claim detailed knowledge of the temperatures, it's quite clear that these are rising: less snowfall (hope I'm not tempting fate!) and fewer frosts - just two in January and two in February! I think it was just the persistence of the rain that made the most difference round here.

But there was one other notable feature of this change in our climate: the well-being of rats. The Daily Telegraph ran an article on 2nd March noting that 'The wet winter has sent rats scurrying to higher ground'! 'Rats can swim and cope with strong currents in open water; they can enter exposed pipes and sewers, but what they cannot tolerate is prolonged submersion - so they're forced to seek higher ground leading to a risk of infestation of properties.'

The report ends by adding another awful fact that the increased milder weather could lead to an increase in their breeding season!

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
